HOW TO USE THIS TOOLKIT






The Peale, Baltimore's Community Museum, has been gathering stories about COVID and vaccination.

In 2021, a coalition of national museum and library associations awarded the Peale a grant for the Communities for Immunity project, an effort to build vaccine confidence and fight the pandemic in local communities.

Based in the oldest museum building in the United States, the Peale's core mission is to amplify the stories of real people in our community. Therefore, we turned to the community itself to help us gather perspectives about vaccination and life during the pandemic. Our community's thoughts, opinions, and experiences are reflected here in hopes that they resonate with someone you know who may still be questioning whether to get vaccinated.





Themes and Audience

In this toolkit, you'll find links to audio stories from all age groups. The "Topics" indicator offers details about what each storyteller discusses. Be mindful that some stories deal with mature themes, like the deaths of family members, drug use, and suicide. All stories include English/Spanish transcripts.

The toolkit also features links to contemporary fables that subtly explore responsibility and accountability. In addition, you'll find a webinar/slides about medical trust, current COVID data, and even an opportunity to wander through a virtual maze with the "Vax Vox" exhibition in Second Life.

4,598,041 VACCINATIONS AND COUNTING IN MARYLAND





As of April 2022, nearly 4,598,041 Marylanders (about 76.39%) have been fully vaccinated. But, that leaves around 24% of us **unvaccinated**. We won't beat around the bush, the purpose of this short toolkit is to encourage **more** folks to get the jab.

We think the first step is hearing from others who have already been vaccinated. On the following page, you'll hear stories from Marylanders who opted to get the shot.

Tavon isn't the only person who was nervous about getting the vaccine. The goal of this toolkit is help reassure people that their hesitation is normal, but that in the end, "you have to do what you have to do," as Tavon muses in his story.








COVID DEATHS

The numbers are grim, but the facts speak for themselves: Nearly ONE MILLION people have died from COVID-19 in the United States as of April 2022. And, the disease is still with us, despite the easing of masking and social distancing practices.



11,212,915,179 billon doses of vaccine given in the world so far. That's roughly 17.5 million each day. (April 2022)


